Galop has expanded its services this year, working directly with 200 victims of homophobic incidents and, through our website, disseminating information to many more.

Galop's new partnership project with

Stonewall Housing has allowed lesbians and gay men enduring homophobic violence at home to receive advice and support from both agencies at once. Since most reported homophobic hate crime takes place in or around the home, this service has been very popular with our clients.

The Black Services Development Project influenced the way that crime prevention agencies work with black and minority ethnic LGBT people. The project's recommendations for Galop have been implemented and the number of black and minority ethnic people using Galop's services has increased.

Galop was commissioned by Greenwich and Bexley Crime and Disorder Reduction Partnerships to research the needs and experiences of local LGBT victims of hate crime and domestic violence. Our findings have been published on our website and, as a result of our research, Galop has received funding to work specifically with LGBT victims of hate crime in Bexley and Greenwich.

Galop was delighted to welcome Sarah Waters, the author of Tipping the Velvet, Affinity and Fingersmith, as its first patron.

Finally, I would like to thank Galop's funders, supporters, staff and in particular its Management Committee volunteers for their commitment, support and hard work over the last year.

The launch of Galop's Assisted Reporting service means that LGBT victims of hate crime can report their experiences to Galop instead of having to speak directly to the police. The service was launched in June 2003 and since then we have received reports of very serious crimes including sexual assaults, robbery and kidnapping, none of which would have otherwise been reported to the police. Clients can report to us in absolute confidence; we will not pass on details of their experience without their permission.

Galop has remained an active member of the Metropolitan Police's independent LGBT Advisory Group which liaises with the police at the highest levels to achieve better policing for the LGBT communities in London.

Galop has worked closely with the Rubicon Society and FtoM London and is delighted to announce that from 2004, its services will be

available to transpeople as well lesbians, gay men and bisexual people. Galop's Business Plan 2004-2007 gives details of our planned developments including the launch of the service for transpeople.

This year Galop has delivered training to many agencies including, the Citizens' Advice Bureau, the London Probation Service and the Metropolitan Police LGBT Liaison Officers. Galop, in partnership with LAGER and PACE delivered training on the new sexual orientation employment regulations across England, Wales and Scotland on behalf of the Department for Trade and Industry.

Next year Galop's staff team will expand to cope with the increasing demand for our service.



Homophobic assault, harassment, robbery, blackmail, rape and indecent assault are some of the main reasons why people contact Galop for advice.

In 2003/2004 Galop dealt with 193 cases. Many of these cases involved harassment (35%) and assault (17%). Most of the harassment cases involved neighbours:

harassment and threats of physical violence from two of her neighbours. She had reported this to the police who said they could do nothing unless they were able to witness the incidents for themselves. Galop spoke to the Metropolitan Police LBGT officer in Susi's area who helped Susi to collect the evidence needed to press charges against her neighbours.

We help people by forming links with their local Metropolitan Police LGBT Liaison Officer, making complaints to the police and Criminal Injury Compensation claims. We also work closely with Stonewall Housing when clients come to us about harassment at home.

A large proportion of homophobic crime goes unreported. Galop aims to help change this situation. Third party reporting to the police is an important and growing part of our work. People can report anonymously if preferred and also via Galop's website.
